Young, Sr. Enrichment & Historical Center, 9569 County Road 235, Wildwood (Royal), FL 34785.

Project Summary: Our project, entitled Roval Historical Enrichment & Art Program (RHEAP), is the cornerstone of the Alonzo A. Young, Sr. Enrichment & Historical Center. The program is offered to the children of Sumter County, FL and housed at the center located in the Community of Royal. Former slaves from the Withlacoochee River formed this community, located 5 miles west of Wildwood, in 1865. The Community is one of the oldest African American communities in the State of Florida. The center once served the Community of Royal school children during segregation. Mr. Alonzo A. Young, Sr. was the last Principal of the Royal Elementary & Middle School, serving 22 years.

Description of Project and Statement of Need: RHEAP, an after school, holiday and summer program, addresses the needs of Sumter County youth and families in a controlled and positive environment. program enhances self-worth among the young participants through the development of interest in history & culture, awareness of opportunities and exploring the arts to build character and self-esteem. The program helps develop the attitudes, characteristics and intellectual skills required to participate effectively in today's society. The program addresses some of the pressing issues for children today, such as violence, nutrition, bullying, tobacco and drug usage. Also, RHEAP features art, history & culture hands-on workshops, i.e. music, visual arts, dramas, and the development of historical collections. Professionals, who are known incorporating youth behavior modification techniques with their teachings, are invited to conduct the workshops.

Such as Alvon Griffin who created a rhythmic that incorporates system algebraic equations, into his drum playing. His workshops allow youth participants to play "plastic buckets"/ drums by using math and geometry rhythms. These rhythms involve 34 different sounds with the end result producing a progressive, entertaining percussion resonance. Mr. Griffin's workshops are a proven tool used as a positive anger management tool. While no specific data to back up these thoughts, caseworkers have found, by observation, that the youth participants have more control over their anger and impulses.

RHEAP's goal is - to enhance self-worth among Sumter County's youth.

RHEAP's objectives are- 80% will have an increased awareness of arts, history, culture and diversity. 80% will have an increased understanding of respecting others rights and the importance of living violent free. 80% will have increased selfesteem via character building techniques. 80% will have an increased understanding of becoming literate. 80% of the young participants will increase their awareness of healthy living alternatives.

RHEAP's target population- this program will target youth in the K-12 Sumter school age children, including youth who are underachieving in school, who are at risk of dropping out of school and who are at risk of criminal or drug involvement due to family or associational circumstances. The program anticipates working with all youth regardless of race, gender or creed.

A Mule Experience' Tour. Formed in 1865, the Community of Royal's first settlers were former slaves from the Old Green Plantation, located west of the community on the Withlacoochee River. Royal is one of Florida's oldest African American communities and has a state-issued historic marker. Equally important is the fact that most of the generations still own their 40 acres, which were issued at the end of the Civil War as part of Forty Acres and a Mule Special Field Order No. 15, issued by Major-General William Tecumseh Sherman, Headquarters Military Division of the Mississippi, in the Field, Savannah, Georgia, on January 16, 1865. Royal, just 5 miles west of Wildwood, FL, is celebrating 151 years of a proud history. Local programming and Royal's rich history are housed at the Alonzo A. Young, Sr. Enrichment & Historical Center, a Governor's Point of Light Project. The Alonzo A. Young, Sr. Enrichment & Historical Center built in 1950 and served as the Royal Elementary & Middle School cafeteria, before de-segregation, houses the program. The historical exhibit room features some of the community's artifacts, articles, pictures & stories, a WEDU TV documentary dvd and companion booklet. "Involving the youth of this area in such a project is a great way to foster appreciation of the genesis of this community as well as enhancing a feeling of pride, self-worth and advocacy through their connection to this important historical time (1860s) in our nation's and state's past. Also, foster the desire in the youth to identify other concerns and problems in order to advocate effective change whether on a local, state, or national basis", stated James Stevens, Former Wildwood Historical Society Member.
